Take It From the Top!

Greetings Town Residents and Businesses!

I hope this message finds you and your families safe and healthy and your business thriving and successful. Below is a brief summary of important topics and project highlights in the Town:

1. **“.gov” website**

The Town of Brookfield recently switched its domain from a “.com” to a “.gov”. You will now see “wi.gov” at the end of the website address and staff email addresses. The new website is www.townofbrookfieldwi.gov. What does this mean to you? After first glance it may not seem like anything worth noting. However, there are many benefits for a municipality to switch to a “.gov” domain. The following list is from the get.gov domain website:

- “.gov” domains are free to eligible organizations (like the Town of Brookfield!)
- “.gov” domains help the public identify official, trusted information.
Anyone can register a .com, .org, or .us domain for a fee. This can make it hard for the public to know if the people behind an online service are who they claim to be.

“.gov” domains are different because they’re only available to U.S.-based government organizations making it easier to identify governments on the internet. The public shouldn’t have to guess whether the site they’re on, or the email in their inbox, is genuine. Use of the “.gov” can help reduce uncertainty.
- Only verified U.S. government organizations can register a “.gov” domain
The Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA), manages the “.gov” top-level domain. They verify the identity of everyone who requests a “.gov” domain and make sure that their organization meets the criteria for having a “.gov” domain.

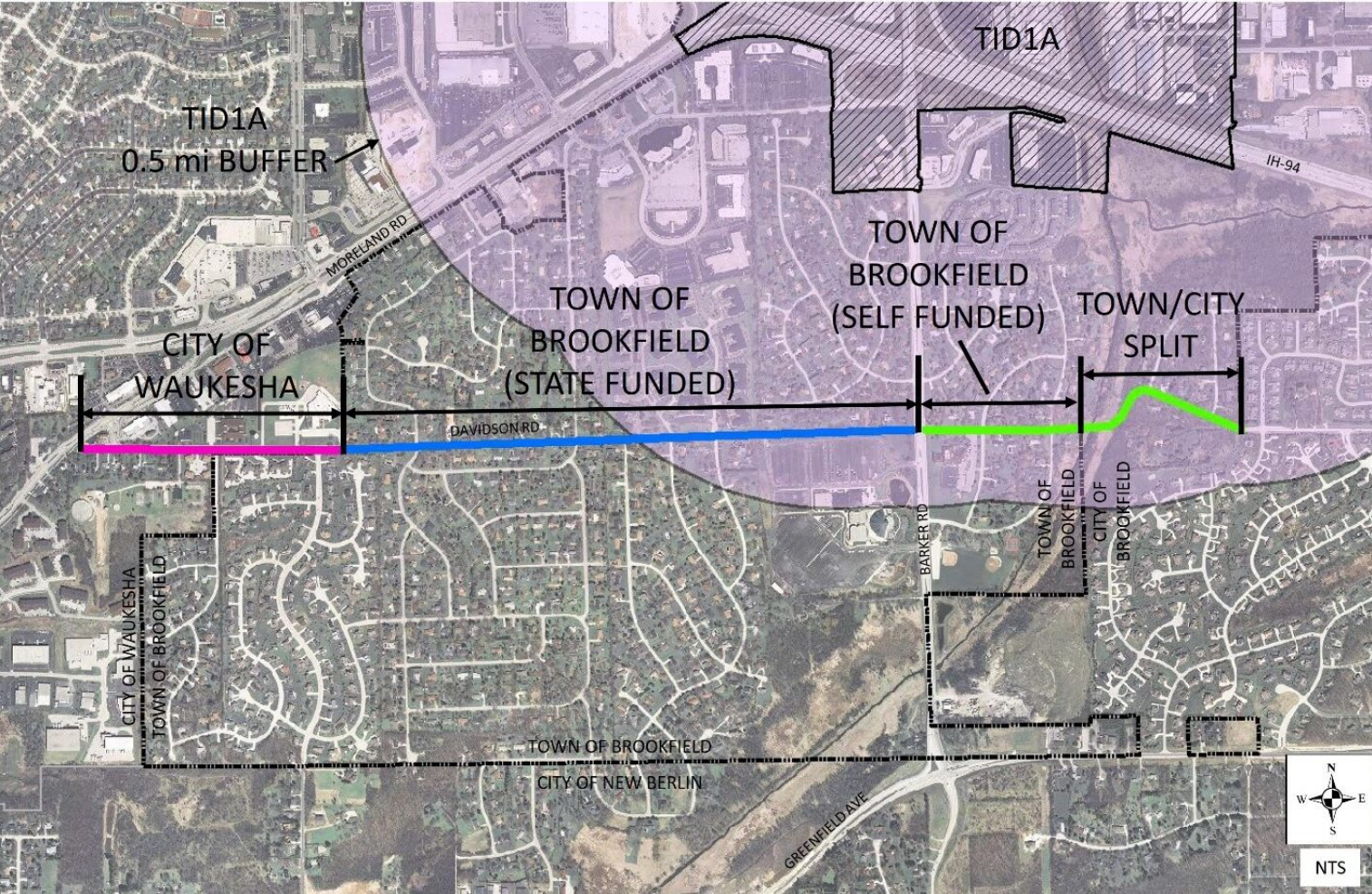
2. **2026/27 Road Program - Davidson Road Reconstruction**

The Town of Brookfield maintains a 5-year Road Program to guide decisions related to local transportation infrastructure improvements. Each year, the Town budgets for and performs routine road maintenance, such as crack sealing or pothole repairs, and capital projects such as road resurfacing or reconstruction projects.

For the 2026/27 Road Program, the Town has partnered with the City of Brookfield and the City of Waukesha to reconstruct Davidson Road from Stonehedge Drive in the City of Brookfield to the western termini in the City of Waukesha. The project includes a combination of asphalt milling and overlay, asphalt pulverizing, reshaping, and overlay

and full reconstruction. In addition to the road work, a new multi-use path and curb and gutter will be installed on the south side of Davidson Road to provide a safe pedestrian connection between Springdale Road and Barker Road (CTH Y). The north side of Davidson Road will continue to be served by ditches and culverts. East of Barker Road (CTH Y) Davidson Road will be widened to include 4-foot paved shoulders on both sides of the road. Stormwater best management practice(s) (BMPs) will also be implemented to meet NR 151 stormwater requirements for the conversion of the rural ditch section to the urban curb and gutter roadway section. Driveway aprons will be replaced in-kind and culvert replacement will be done on an as-needed basis.

Project Funding (Town portion only)

The Town applied for and received grant funding through the Wisconsin Department of Transportation’s Local Road Improvements Program in the amount of \$1.73 million. The total project cost for the Town is estimated to be approximately \$3.1 million. The remaining \$1.37 million will be funded through a combination of Tax Incremental District (TID) funds, stormwater utility funds, and general tax levy.

Project Timeline

The Davidson Road Reconstruction project has been delayed until 2027 to accommodate the relocation of existing utilities that will occur in 2026. The graphic below provides an anticipated project timeline.

A Message From Town Supervisor John Schatzman

Dear Town of Brookfield Resident,

After serving as your Town Supervisor since October 2004, I have made the difficult decision to step down from public service so I can focus on my health and my family as I continue to battle stage 4 cancer.

It has been a true honor to represent the residents, constituents, and business community of the Town of Brookfield.

Over the past 21 years, the Town has experienced significant growth and change. One of the most notable developments has been The Corners of Brookfield, which has added more than \$250 million to the Town's tax base and brought important economic activity to our community. In addition, the new Wimmer Communities project, valued at more than \$120 million, now stands across from that site, replacing the former Motel 6 property.

When I first took office in 2004, I promised to evaluate every expenditure as if it were coming from my own wallet. That principle has guided my service and has helped shape the decisions made by the Town Board over the years.

I am grateful to have served alongside dedicated public officials, including Town Chair Keith Henderson and Supervisors Steve Kohlmann, Ryan Stanelle, and John Charlier. I also want to recognize Town Administrator Tom Hagie and Town Clerk Emily Howells for the effective and steady way they manage the Town's daily operations.

The Town of Brookfield has always tried to plan wisely for the future. We consider not only the needs of today, but also the costs and responsibilities that may grow over the next 5, 10, and 20 years. While our residential population is about 6,500, our daytime population grows to more than 60,000 because of our location along the Bluemound Road and I-94 corridor. That reality requires thoughtful planning and responsible management.

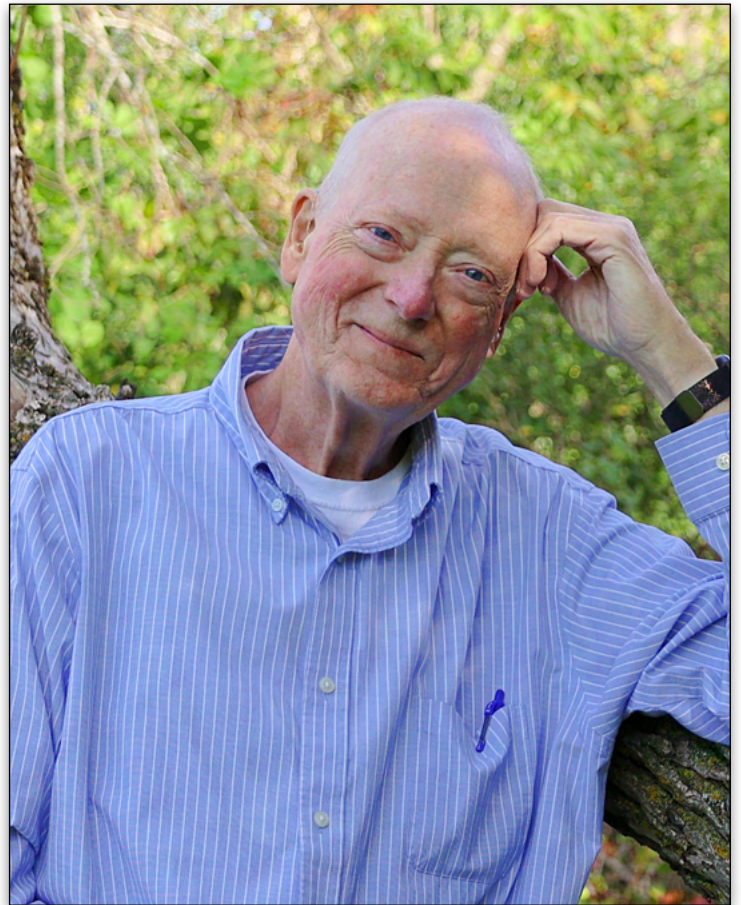

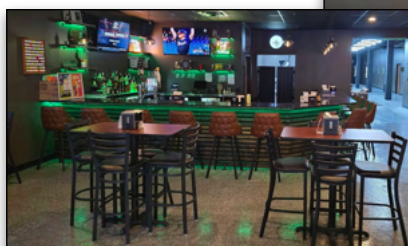
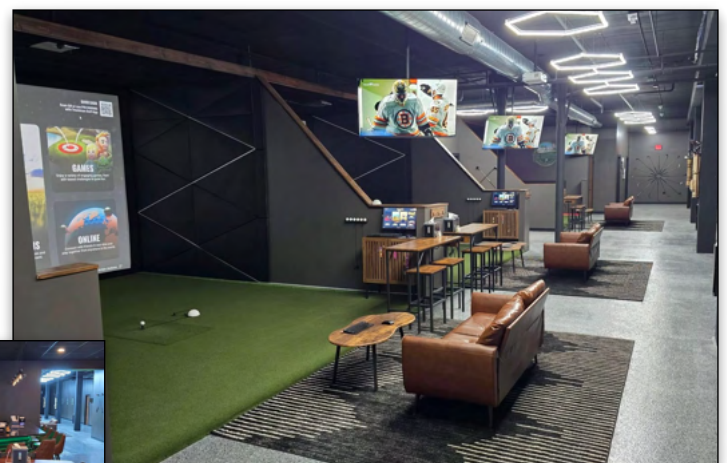

Pet Licensing

The Town of Brookfield requires a license for dogs that are five months of age or older. Licenses are valid for the calendar year. License fees are as follows:

- Spayed/Neutered: \$15.00
- Unspayed/Unneutered: \$20.00
- Late Fee \$5.00**

**If you're new to the Town of Brookfield, or, if your dog is new to you, the late fee is waived.

Applications are available online or at the Town Clerk's office.

Applicants/Owners must also provide the following each year:

- Rabies Vaccination Certificate
- Proof of spay/neuter
- Signed Vicious Dog Declaration Certification
- Limit of two dogs per household

Garbage and Recycling Information

The Town of Brookfield contracts with Johns Disposal for residential garbage, recycling and yard waste collection. Service schedules and other helpful information is highlighted on the Johns Disposal Town of Brookfield Community Page, including links to the service map, collection schedule, and a service information brochure. If your garbage, recycling or yard waste is not collected please call Johns Disposal at 262-473-4700. Residents also get one free bulk pickup a month! Call Johns today to schedule your pickup.

Fire Inspection Fees

Fire prevention fire inspections will be conducted on businesses and multi-family occupancies this fall by the Town of Brookfield Fire Department. These fees are a special charge against property under § 66.0627, Wis. Stats., and are invoiced to property owners by the Town Clerk's office in July of each year. Any fees remaining unpaid as of November 1 each year will be placed on the annual tax roll for collection with an administrative charge of \$15 per parcel. Property owners may consult the Town of Brookfield Ordinances under Chapter 5 for additional information.

POLICE UPDATE



New Police Officers

The Town of Brookfield Police Department (TBDP) is proud to announce its newest officers!

Move Over Law requires drivers to shift lanes or slow down in order to provide a "safety zone" for a squad car, ambulance, fire truck, tow truck, utility vehicle or highway maintenance vehicle stopped on the side of a road with warning lights flashing. The law also protects disabled vehicles stopped along the road with hazard lights on, emergency devices or flares placed near the vehicle, or one or more persons attending to the vehicle and visible to motorists.

Drivers have two options for creating a safety zone:

- If the road has "more than one directional lane", like the Interstate, and you can switch lanes safely, "you must move over" to vacate the lane closest to the law enforcement or other vehicle with its lights flashing.
- If the road has a "single directional lane" or you can't safely move over, "you must reduce your speed".

Summertime Parking Reminder

During the summer there are parking restrictions in the Town of Brookfield for overnight and areas specifically posted. Overnight Parking Restrictions are as follows: Unless authorized, no person shall park or leave standing any vehicle upon any street or highway in the Town from 2:00 a.m. to 6:00 a.m.

If you need to leave a vehicle on the street during those hours please contact the police department at 262-796-3798 in advance and request authorization.

For gatherings or parties, please keep all streets passable so a fire truck or ambulance can get through; have everyone park on one side of the street.

Unused Medicine and Prescription Drop-Off

The Town of Brookfield Police Department participates in the biannual Drug Take Back Day usually in April and October at the police department. In 2024, we collected 418 pounds of used or unwanted medications for safe disposal. In 2025, we collected 259 pounds, and so far in 2026 we have collected and disposed of 126 pounds.

Town of Brookfield's Drug Collection Unit site is open to the public from the hours of 8:00 a.m. -4:00 p.m. Monday-Friday at the Police Department.

Items that are **NOT ACCEPTED** include, needles/sharps/syringes, inhalers, aerosol cans, thermometers, biohazardous material (anything containing a bodily fluid or blood), hydrogen peroxide, household hazardous waste (paint, pesticides, oil, gas), and personal care products (shampoo, soaps, lotions, sunscreens, ointments, etc.).





1. Pause Before You Act

Many scams rely on creating urgency and pressure. This would focus on helping residents recognize those tactics and reinforce the importance of slowing down and verifying unexpected requests.

2. Think Before You Click

Email and text-based scams remain one of the most common ways people are targeted. This could focus on general awareness around unexpected messages and the importance of caution before clicking links or providing information.

3. Don't Trust the Voice Alone

With the rise of AI-driven scams, phone calls can sound like they're coming from trusted individuals. While less common today, this is an emerging risk worth introducing early.

Not Permitted on Any Town Roads:



Town of Brookfield Ordinance 9.22 Regulating Off-Road Recreational Vehicles

The Town of Brookfield Police Department would like to remind Town Residents, and Visitors, that Town Ordinance 9.22 **does not** permit for off-road vehicles such as **dirt bikes, minibikes, trail bikes, ATVs** or **UTVs**, or **golf carts**, designed to operate and intended for operation off public roads to be operated on any Town roadways, highways, shoulders, or drainage ditches, or any Town Park. Off-road vehicles may operate on private property with some restrictions.

WARNING SIRENS REMINDER

Spring time is here again and so begins our severe weather season. As severe weather approaches, you may hear the Town weather warning sirens sounding. But why? The Town sirens are activated under the following conditions:

Tornado is on the ground that is an immediate threat to the town.

High winds greater than 80 mph or large hail posing an immediate threat to health, safety and property.

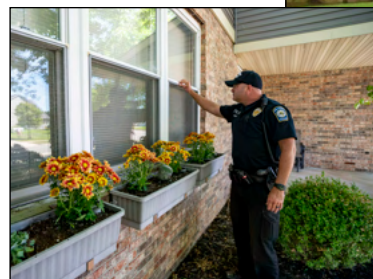
A funnel cloud is aloft, posing an imminent threat and is reported by a reliable source.

The Town owns six sirens, similar to the one pictured here, that are strategically located throughout the Town and which are activated by Waukesha County. Waukesha County works closely with the National Weather Service to ensure severe weather information is accurate and timely.



Vacation House Checks

If you are going on vacation or if you are leaving the area for any reason, contact the police department and request a house check. You will be asked to provide pertinent information (Name, address, emergency contact person, if lights will be left on, vehicles in driveway, if you have a current alarm service, and if anyone will be at your residence while you are away). This is a free service to Town residents provided by the police department.

Grilling Safety

There's nothing like outdoor grilling. It's one of the most popular ways to cook food. But, a grill placed too close to anything that can burn is a fire hazard. They can be very hot, causing burn injuries. Follow these simple tips and you will be on the way to safe grilling.

SAFETY TIPS

- » Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- » The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- » Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- » Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- » Never leave your grill unattended.
- » Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

CHARCOAL GRILLS

- » There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- » If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- » Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- » There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- » When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

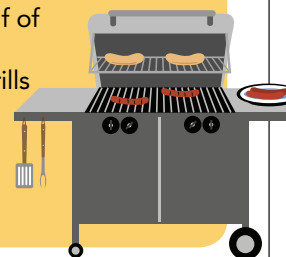
PROpane Grills

Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off both the gas tank and the grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. **If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department.** Do not move the grill.

If the flame **goes out**, turn the grill and gas off and wait at least **5 minutes** before re-lighting it.

FACTS

- ! July is the peak month for grill fires.
- ! Roughly half of the injuries involving grills are thermal burns.

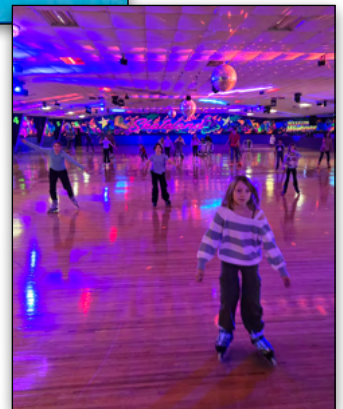


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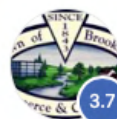

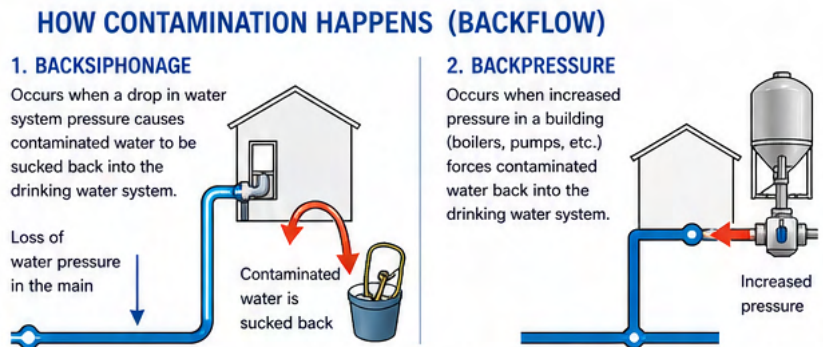


Protect our Water by Preventing Cross Connections:

Every glass of water you pour from your tap is protected by a state-mandated safety initiative known as the **Cross Connection Control (CCC) Program**. This program is by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) under **Administrative Code NR 810.15**. This program ensures that "backflow"—the reverse flow of contaminated water into the public supply—is prevented.

What is a Cross Connection?

A cross connection is any actual or potential link between safe drinking water and a source of pollution or contamination. These connections can occur in everyday household and industrial settings. Water normally flows in one direction; however, under certain conditions water can actually flow backward. If a water main breaks or a fire hydrant is opened nearby it can cause a sudden drop in water pressure where non-potable water could be "sucked" back into your home's pipes and potentially back into the safe drinking water lines.



Common hazards include:

- **Submerged Hoses:** A garden hose left submerged in a pool, laundry tub, or chemical bucket.
- **Inside the Home:** Sinks and showers - If the faucet is too low and sits below the "flood rim" of the sink. Toilet fill valves, and water softeners that do not have a proper air gap at the drain.
- **Irrigation Systems:** Lawn sprinklers that could pull pesticides or fertilizer back into the lines without proper backflow protection.
- **Industrial Equipment:** Boilers, chemical mixing tanks, or medical equipment connected directly to water lines.

Prevention and Protection Methods:

To block backflow, the state plumbing code (SPS 382.41) requires specific protective devices:

- **Air Gaps:** The simplest and most effective method is ensuring there is a physical gap between the water source (faucet) and the potential contaminant
- **Vacuum Breakers:** A small, inexpensive brass screw-on device that allows water to flow out to your hose but prevents it from being sucked back in. Some hose bibs may have them built in; look for ASSE 1019 or 1011 markings on the device.
- **Installing Approved Plumbing Devices:** Look for ASSE 1002 on toilet fill valves and ASSE 1014 on handheld shower heads.
- **Testable Assemblies:** Complex valves (like Reduced Pressure Zone or RPZ valves) often used in commercial settings that require annual testing by a state-certified tester.

Wisconsin Program Requirements

Under [NR 810.15](#), every municipal water supplier must develop and implement a comprehensive CCC program that includes public education and onsite inspections. Residential inspections are completed during routine water meter replacements to minimize disruption. These inspections normally take 10-15 minutes. During these inspections, we look for properly installed **vacuum breakers** on outside faucets, proper **air gaps** on laundry tubs and kitchen sinks, and any illegal connections to boilers or water softeners. Commercial and industrial inspections are scheduled and completed by HydroCorp Inc.

Property owners are responsible for eliminating any cross connections identified during an inspection. Failure to comply can lead to fines or the disconnection of water service to protect the broader public. Odd-numbered property addresses are permitted to sprinkle only on odd-numbered days of the month and only between the hours of 6:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m. Odd-numbered day is determined by whatever day of the month it is at 6:00 p.m. and carries through to 8:00 a.m. the following day. The same holds true for even-numbered property addresses on even-numbered days.

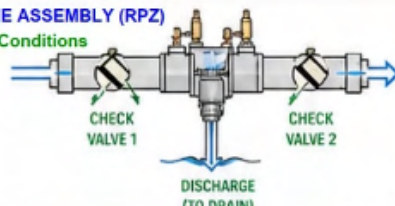

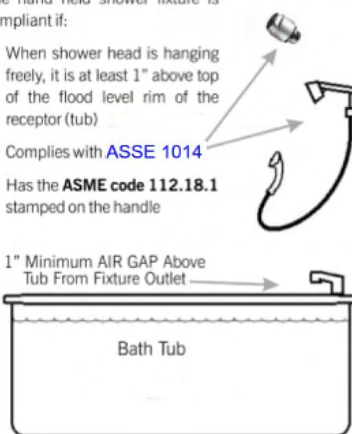

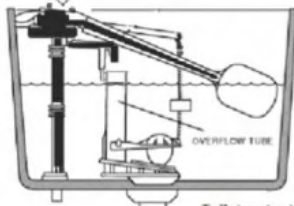

- Replace any unapproved devices with an **ASSE #1002** approved anti siphon ball-cock assembly. Average cost is typically \$12 to \$22 at home improvement stores
- Verify overflow tube is one inch below critical level (CL) marking on the device

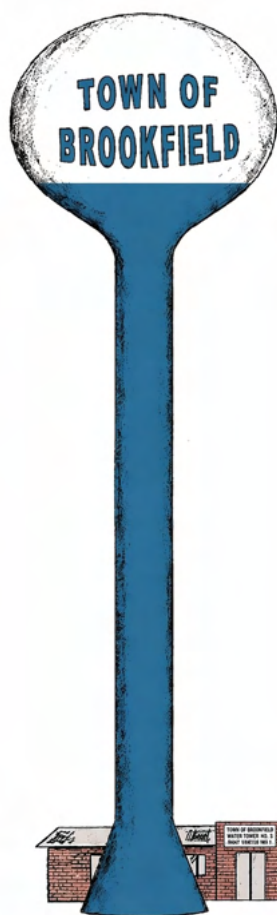
We are pleased to present this year's Annual Water Quality Report. This report is designed to inform you about the quality of your water and the service we deliver to you every day. Our goal is to provide you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. We want you to understand the efforts we make to continually improve the water treatment process and protect our water resources. We are committed to ensuring the quality of your water. Our water comes from the shallow dolomite aquifer. We have six wells and they all flow through filters to remove the iron that is common in the shallow aquifer. Because of the water quality, we are only required to add a small amount of chlorine for disinfection, and the water is ready for the distribution system. The Sanitary District's licensed operators are here to ensure the excellent water quality 24 hours a day, every day of the year. On an average day, the Sanitary District provides the Town of Brookfield with 700,000 gallons of water.

Health Information

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's safe drinking water hotline (800-426-4791).

Some individuals may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, individuals with HIV/AIDS or other immune systems disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA and CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Environmental Protection Agency's safe drinking water hotline (800-426-4791).

Sanitary District No. 4 is pleased that the drinking water provided to you meets all federal and state requirements. Educational Information

The sources of drinking water, both tap water and bottled water, include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which shall provide the same protection for public health.

Additional Health Information

Lead can cause serious health effects in people of all ages, especially pregnant individuals, infants (both formula-fed and breastfed), and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and parts used in service lines and in home plumbing. Town of Brookfield Sanitary District No. 4 is responsible for providing high quality drinking water and removing lead pipes but cannot control the variety of materials used in the plumbing in your home. Because lead levels may vary over time, lead exposure is possible even when your tap sampling results do not detect lead at one point in time. You can help protect yourself and your family by identifying and removing lead materials within your home plumbing and taking steps to reduce your family's risk. Using a filter, certified by an American National Standards Institute accredited certifier to reduce lead, is effective in reducing lead exposures. Follow the instructions provided with the filter to ensure the filter is used properly. Use only cold water for drinking, cooking, and making baby formula. Boiling water does not remove lead from water. Before using tap water for drinking, cooking, or making baby formula, flush your pipes for several minutes. You can do this by running your tap, taking a shower, doing laundry or a load of dishes. If you have a lead service line or galvanized requiring replacement service line, you may need to flush your pipes for a longer period. If you are concerned about lead in your water and wish to have your water tested, contact Town Of Brookfield Sanitary District 4 (Tony Skof at 262-798-8629). Additional Information on Service Line Materials

The Town of Brookfield has no lead piping or lead water-service laterals in our system. However, we are required to develop an initial inventory of service lines connected to our distribution system by October 16, 2024 and to make the inventory publicly accessible. PFAS Contaminants with a Recommended Health Advisory Level

Perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) are a large group of human-made chemicals that have been used in industry and consumer products worldwide since the 1950's. The following table lists PFAS contaminants which were detected in your water and that have a Recommended Public Health Groundwater Standard (RPHGS) or Health Advisory Level (HAL). There are no violations for detections of contaminants that exceed the RPHGS or HAL. The RPHGS are levels at which concentrations of the contaminant present a health risk and are based on guidance provided by the Wisconsin Department of Health Services.

Note: The recommended health-based levels in the table below were in effect in 2024. These levels were revised by WDHS in 2025. They can be found here <https://www.dhs.wisconsin.gov/water/gws.htm>

Typical Source of Contaminant

Drinking water is one way that people can be exposed to PFAS. In Wisconsin, two-thirds of people use groundwater as their drinking water source. PFAS can get in groundwater from places that make or use PFAS and release from consumer products in landfills.

Definition of Terms

AL (Action Level): The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

HA (Health Advisory): An estimate of acceptable drinking water levels for a chemical substance based on health effects information

HAL (Health Advisory Level): Is a concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, poses a health risk and may require a system to post a public notice. Health Advisories are determined by US EPA.

HI (Hazard Index): A Hazard Index is used to assess the potential health impacts associated with mixtures of contaminants. Hazard Index guidance for a class of contaminants or mixture of contaminants may be determined by the US EPA or Wisconsin Department of Health Services. If a Health Index is exceeded a system may be required to post a public notice.

Level 1 assessment: Is a study of the water system to identify potential problems and determine, if possible, why total coliform bacteria have been found in our water system.

Level 2 assessment: is a very detailed study of the water system to identify potential problems and determine, if possible, why an E. coli MCL violation has occurred or why total coliform bacteria have been found in our water system, or both, on multiple occasions.

MCL (Maximum Contaminant Level): The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

MCLG (Maximum Contaminant Level Goal): The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

MFL: Million fibers per liter

MRDL (Maximum residual disinfectant level): The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

MRDLG (Maximum residual disinfectant level goal): The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

mrem/year: millirems per year (a measure of radiation absorbed by the body)

NTU: Nephelometric Turbidity Units

pCi/l: picocuries per liter (a measure of radioactivity)

ppm: parts per million, or milligrams per liter (mg/l)

ppb: parts per billion, or micrograms per liter (ug/l)

ppt: parts per trillion, or nanograms per liter

ppq: parts per quadrillion, or picograms per liter

PHGS (Public Health Groundwater Standards): are found in NR 140 Groundwater Quality. The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, poses a health risk and may require a system to post a public notice.

RPHGS (Recommended Public Health Groundwater Standards): Groundwater standards proposed by the Wisconsin Department of Health Services. The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, poses a health risk and may require a system to post a public notice.

SMCL (Secondary drinking water standards or Secondary Maximum Contaminant Levels): Contaminants that affect taste, odor, or appearance of the drinking water. The SMCLs do not represent health standards.

TCR: Total Coliform Rule

TT (Treatment Technique): A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.
